(PAH) County Clerk John Hogan- “Around the County – Historic Pride” Program

County Clerk Hogan was introduced and came forward to discuss his “Around the County Initiative”. Two years ago he determined that there were many records kept at the county level that should be provided to the individual municipalities for their records. The County will still keep the original. However, the poster provided will hang in the corridors at the County and will be displayed in the Borough Hall in Harrington Park.

Clerk Hogan also informed the audience of the variety of programs provided to the residents of Bergen County. This includes, mobile passport locations, voter registration. Business trade names, notary services.

Ms. Gerri Gibney, President of the Historical Society, Mrs. Ethel Johnson (Historian) and Mr. Davis Ross (Historian) were present to receive this display along with Mayor Hoelscher. The display included one of the oldest maps of Harrington Park (1907), Fire fighter exemption letters, and a historic list of a variety of items from 1904 to date.

The presentation board is available for viewing in the Borough Clerk's office and will be hung in Borough Hall permanently.

(PAH) Mr. Gregory Polyniak, Borough Engineer-Report

- Lynn Street Phase 1 is complete.
- Light pole locations are marked out at Highland Field.
- Swim Club crossing had sod placed at corners and the flashing signs were removed and replaced with ones with timers (as per bid specs). Should be completed by mid-October.
- Generator Grants bids were over budget. The project was reviewed and reconfigured and will be ready for rebid in October.
- Borough Attorney will be reviewing the bid documents for Lynn Street with a determination made at the October meeting.
- 2016 NJDOT-Dean Street submission has been provided.
- Riverside Cooperative street paving is completed (Highland, Manor and Martin).
- Both PAH and MRUT inquired about the generator project and both wanted to ensure that both locations will receive adequate power for their needs.
- GP stated yes, there were a few concessions but both ALB and MK were satisfied with the compromises.

Put the Brakes on Fatalities Day®
October 10, 2015
PROCLAMATION

October 10, 2015, has been declared **Put the Brakes on Fatalities Day®** by the Harrington Park Police Department, Bergen County, New Jersey;

- WHEREAS, Across the nation, traffic crashes caused approximately 32,675(est.) fatalities in 2014, and are the leading cause of death for young people ages 15 to 34; and,
- WHEREAS, In New Jersey, 556 individuals lost their lives in traffic crashes in 2014; and,
- WHEREAS, Alcohol-related crashes accounted for 27.0 percent of the State's traffic fatalities, while 26 percent of all fatal crashes involved traveling at unsafe speeds; and,

WHEREAS, Motorcyclists, bicycle riders and pedestrians face increased risks on New Jersey's roadways, as people opt for alternative modes of transportation; and,

WHEREAS, 60 motorcyclists, 11 bicyclists and 170 pedestrians were killed in New Jersey in traffic-related crashes in 2014; and,

WHEREAS, Safer driving behaviors such as buckling up, every ride; obeying posted speed limits; stopping for pedestrians in crosswalks and using crosswalks when walking; avoiding aggressive driving behaviors; never driving impaired; wearing proper safety gear while riding a motorcycle or bicycle; and, focusing solely on driving by avoiding distractions, can dramatically reduce the number of traffic-related injuries and deaths;

Now, therefore, I Mayor Paul A. Hoelscher, Harrington Park, Bergen County, New Jersey, do hereby proclaim October 10, 2015, Put the Brakes on Fatalities Day®, and call upon everyone to put these lifesaving behaviors into practice to improve safety on the roadways in our community and throughout the State.

Recommendations were distributed at the June 19, 2015 meeting. They detail issues at Highland Avenue, Lynn Street, Elliot Road, Martha Road and Glen

Avenue. Most of the concerns are already posted and practiced, but the Borough should make the traffic changes official by Ordinance.

AN inquired if the ruling are enforced all year or only during the school session.

MRUT was concerned about issue due to emergencies or temporary purposes.

JP has concerns about Highland regarding the traffic flow and restrictions.

MR noted that Highland is used often when other roads are closed due to construction and repairs and there should be consideration for keeping the road unrestricted.

JC is puzzled about the issues on Highland and would like to discuss to further understand why the stop signs do not work.

GE would like to consider moveable speed bumps which would slow the traffic down and might deter some of the larger vehicles from traveling the road. GE has asked Mark Kiernan from the DPW to provide him with information that would work well at that location in conjunction with the DPW regarding plowing and maintenance, etc.

GE would like to have JRD move ahead with a traffic Ordinance, but hold on the Highland Avenue component.

MR asked what the process would be. It was explained that a traffic ordinance would be created to address the other recommendations and once Council decides on Highland Avenue, the ordinance can be amended.
